

Application Bingo

1. You will need a list of examples that match all the application terms you have been talking about. Here is a list of several different applications terms and their examples that you could use. It would be good to use examples based on where your clients live.

You will need to make cards with the examples on them but not with the term on that card. Students will pick a card one at a time and then figure out what term that example matches and then cross it off their grid if they have it on their grid (if it was one of the terms they chose to put on their grid).

2. Hand out the grid. Tell students they can write just one term in each box, and they can't use any term more than once. Tell them they cannot copy their neighbor's work. Everyone should have a different grid, and their terms should be in a different order than their neighbors. Put an example on the board to show them but don't let them just copy your example.
3. Have the example cards in a basket. Have students pull out one card at a time. Then ask them what term that card matches. If they get it right then show it to everyone and tell them what term it is (write it on the board) and if they wrote that term on their grid then they can cross it out. Continue this.
4. If you have a big grid with 5+ columns and rows then you could just play regular 5 in a row Bingo. If you use a smaller grid like the one I use then you will probably want to play until the first person gets ALL of their boxes crossed out.
5. Once someone has them all crossed out they are the winner! You can choose to keep going until everyone gets theirs crossed out or you can play a new game.
